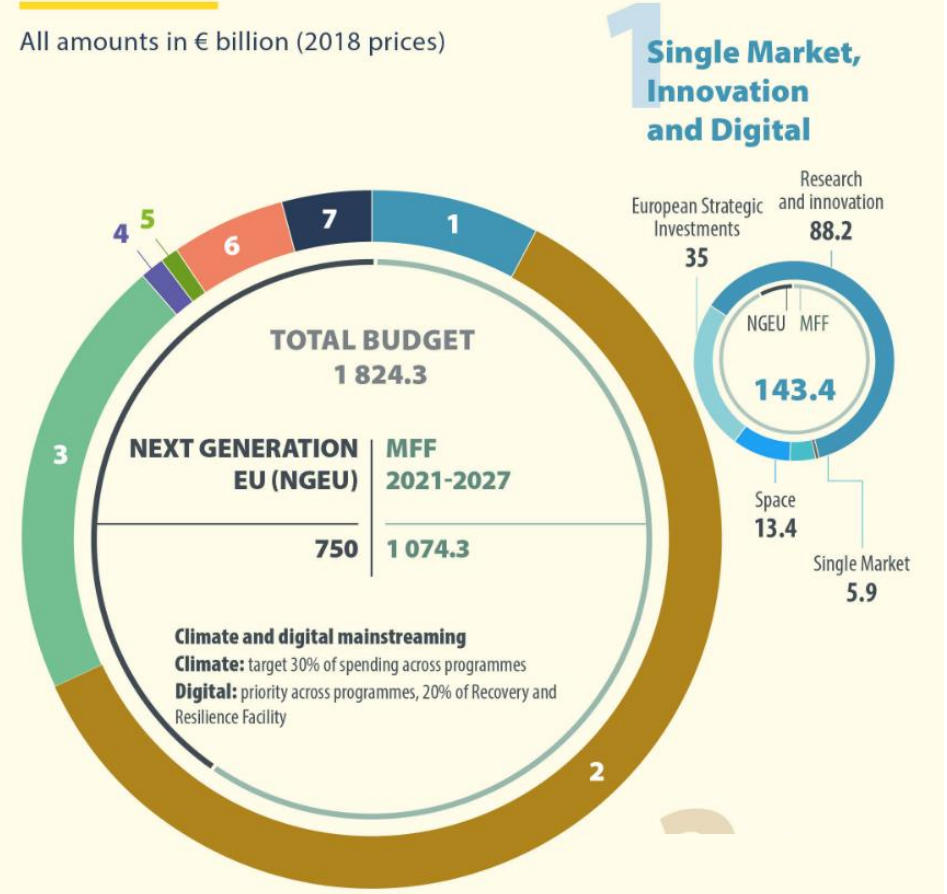

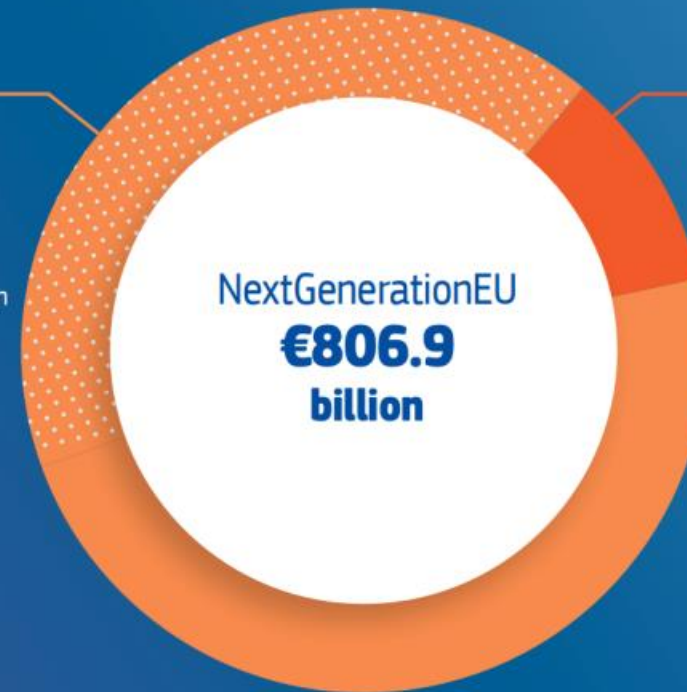

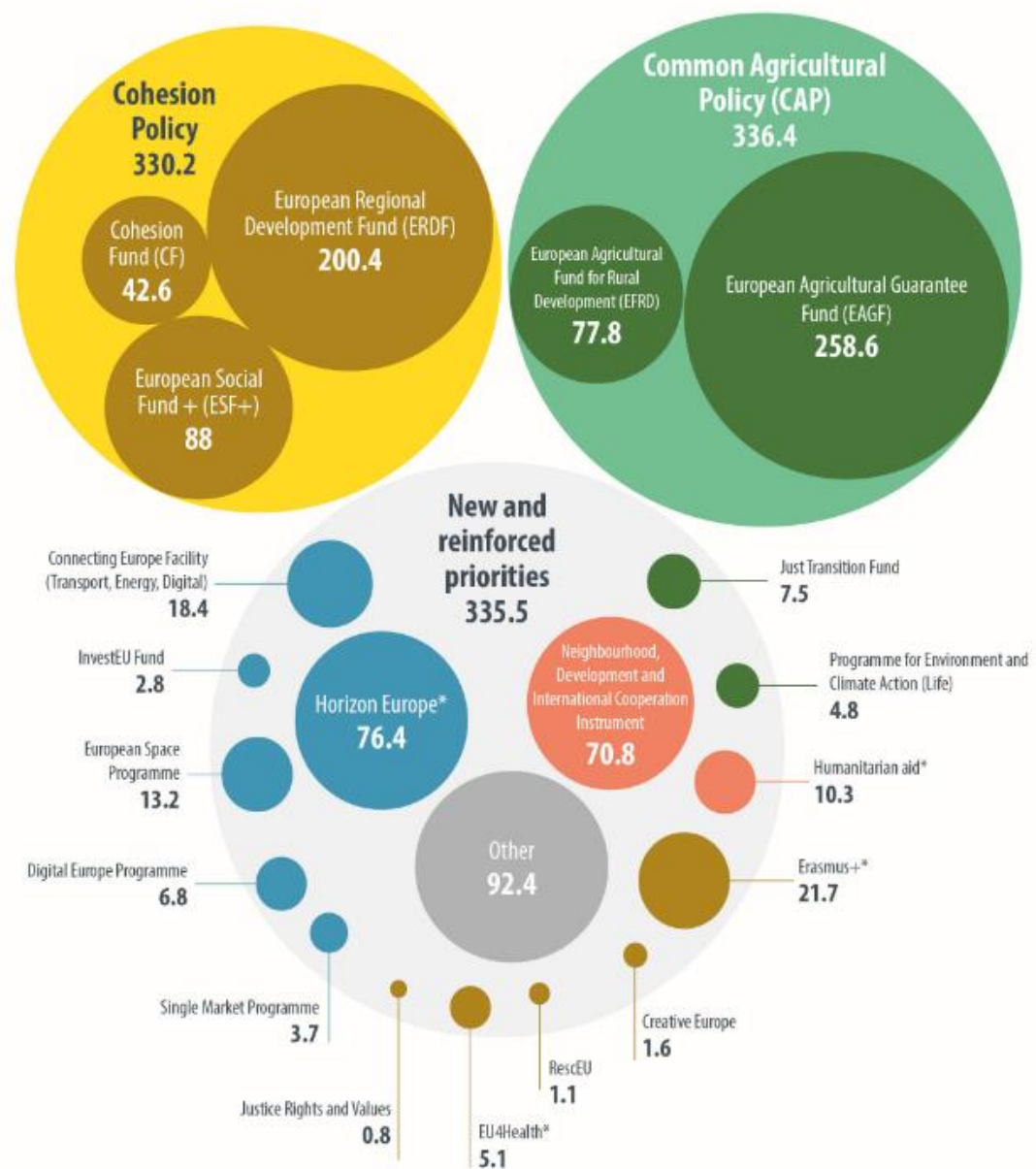

Eu programmes: implementation modes

All the programmes funded by the EU budget fall under one of three types of implementation modes depending on the nature of the funding concerned:

- **direct management: EU funding is managed directly by the European Commission**
- **shared management:** the European Commission and national authorities jointly manage the funding
- **indirect management:** funding is managed by partner organisations or other authorities inside or outside the EU

In direct management, the European Commission is directly responsible for all steps in a programme's implementation:

- launching the calls for proposals
- evaluating submitted proposals
- signing grant agreements
- monitoring project implementation
- assessing the results
- making payments

These tasks are carried out by the Commission's departments, at its headquarters, in the EU delegations or through EU executive agencies; there are no third parties.

Programmes implemented in direct management account for around 20% of the EU budget 2021-2027.

Calls for proposals under direct management are published on the Funding and Tenders Portal (SEDIA)

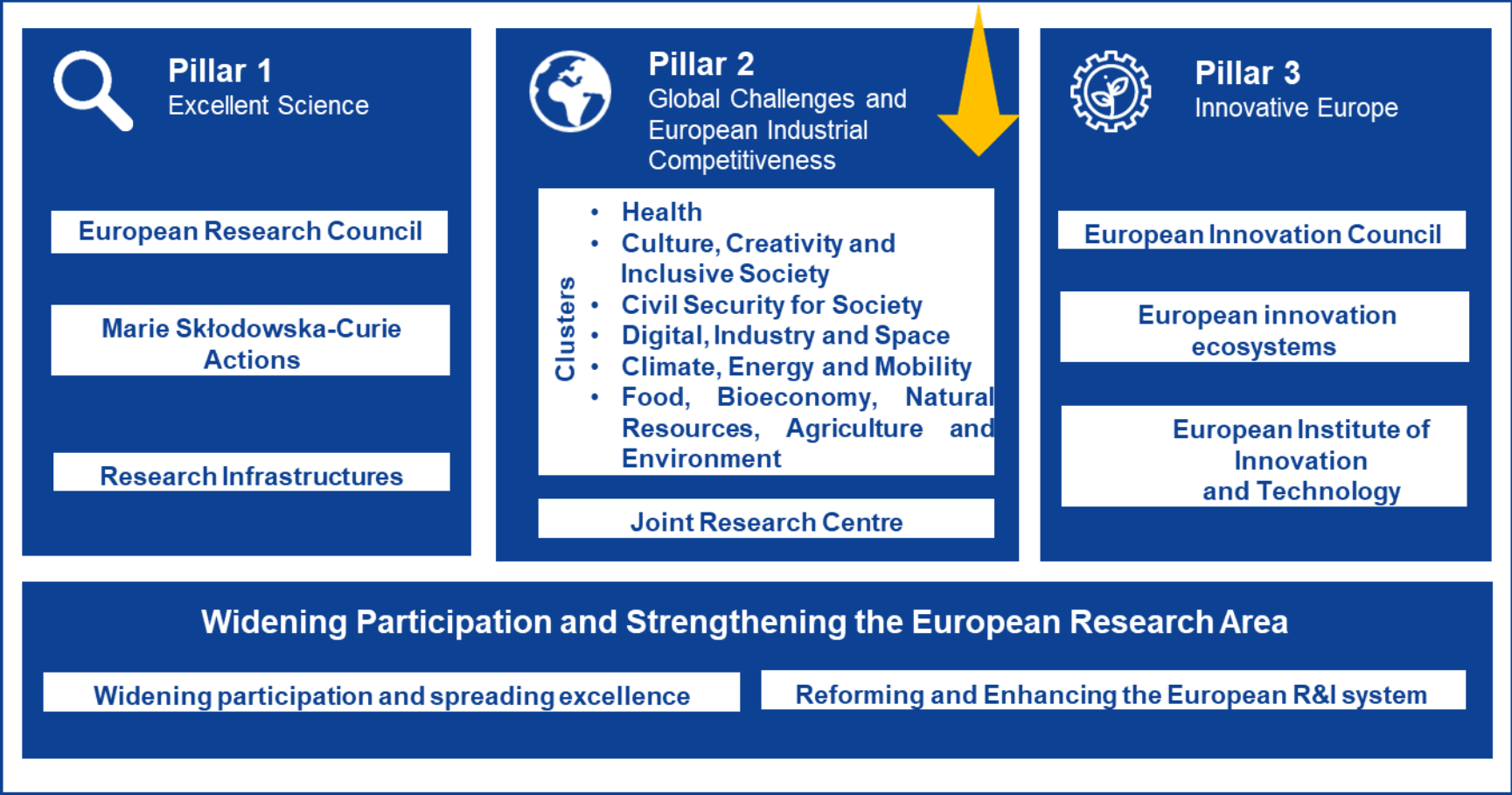

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE

Art. 22.1 – Horizon Europe Regulation

“Any legal entity, regardless of its place of establishment and including legal entities from non-associated third countries or international organisations, may participate in actions under the Programme, provided that the conditions laid down in this Regulation have been met together with any conditions laid down in the work programme or call for proposals.”

Legal status :
natural persons, legal persons,
entities without legal personality.



HOW PARTICIPATE (COLLABORATIVE RESEARCH)

Art. 22.2 – Horizon Europe Regulation

“Except in duly justified cases where the work programme otherwise provides, legal entities forming a consortium shall be eligible for participation in actions under the Programme provided that the consortium includes:

- ***(a) at least one independent legal entity established in a Member State; and***
- ***(b) at least two other independent legal entities each established in different Member States or associated countries****

Minimum conditions for
CONSORTIA:

- *At least 3 independent entities*
- *established in 3 different Member States or Associated Countries.*
- *At least 1 entity established in a Member State*

* *“unless: (a) the work programme provides otherwise, if duly justified...”*

Evaluation criteria (RIAs and IAs)

EXCELLENCE

- ✓ Clarity and pertinence of the **project's objectives**, and the extent to which the proposed work is ambitious, and goes beyond the state-of-the-art.
- ✓ Soundness of the proposed **methodology**, including the underlying concepts, models, assumptions, interdisciplinary approaches, appropriate consideration of the **gender dimension** in research and innovation content, and the quality of **open science practices** including sharing and management of research outputs and engagement of citizens, civil society and end users where appropriate.

IMPACT

- ✓ Credibility of the **pathways** to achieve the expected **outcomes and impacts** specified in the work programme, and the likely scale and significance of the contributions due to the project.
- ✓ Suitability and quality of the **measures to maximize expected outcomes and impacts**, as set out in the dissemination and exploitation plan, including communication activities.

QUALITY AND EFFICIENCY OF THE IMPLEMENTATION

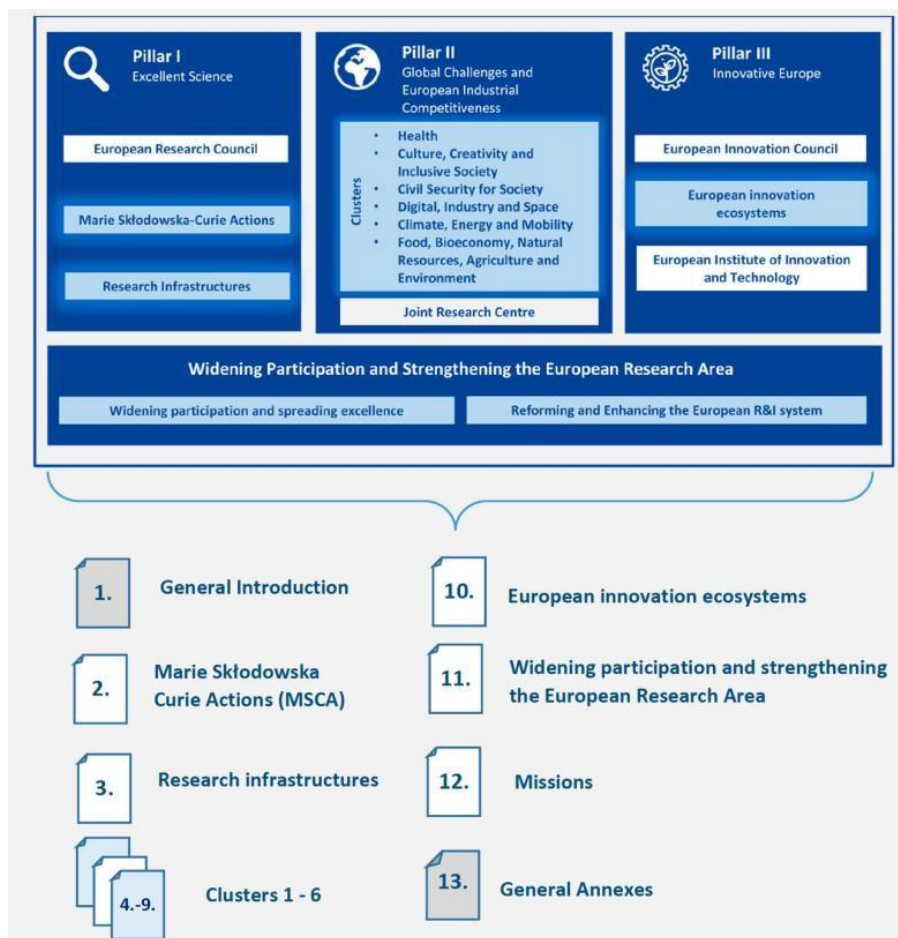
- ✓ Quality and effectiveness of the **work plan**, assessment of risks, and appropriateness of the effort assigned to work packages, and the resources overall.
- ✓ Capacity and role of each **participant**, and extent to which the **consortium** as a whole brings together the necessary expertise.

POLICY CONTEXT

EUROPEAN GREEN DEAL



FOOD 2030

- Research and Innovation topic in line with the European Green Deal priorities, the Farm to Fork strategy for a fair, healthy and environment-friendly food systems and the FOOD 2030 policy framework



Contribute to widespread the new knowledge and innovative solutions generated in EU projects to tackle food fraud in the food supply chain



EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- **Widespread use of existing new knowledge and innovative solutions** by end-users tackling food fraud;
- **Better incorporation of the end-users' needs into the activities of research and innovation communities**, which would generate a better targeted and shared food fraud research agenda for innovation-driven research.
- **Improved skills and long-term availability of training and education material** and on-line communities for end-users on how to tackle food fraud.

Related impact: sustainable, healthy and inclusive food systems delivering co-benefits



SCOPE

- **Development of a community of practice** to foster knowledge exchange between end users and research and innovation ecosystems who will work together mapping existing food fraud practices.
- **Compilation of a comprehensive description of the state of new knowledge**, practices, procedures, systems and technologies tackling food fraud. Proposals **should focus on the cost/benefit aspects of the practices and innovations collected**
- **Identification and mapping of possible relations and synergies** with other networks, projects, initiatives and policy and funding instruments at regional, national and European level
- **Creation of tailor-made communication materials summarizing**, sharing and presenting, in a language easily understandable for end-users, existing best practices and innovations that are close to implementation into practice

Current evidence suggests that the global fight against corruption faces serious challenges: policy decisions are not well informed, the corruption landscape is complex and enormous, while measuring corruption is so far mostly based on subjective approaches, and there is lack of appropriate technological tools to support anti-corruption. To address these challenges, FALCON is designed and dedicated to support the composition, update and management of comprehensive corruption intelligence pictures, within domains and jurisdictions of interest. This will be accomplished following a multi-actor, evidence-based, data-driven approach, building upon existing assets and prior work of consortium partners. FALCON will, first, develop and validate objective and actionable indicators (individual and composite) of corruption that can be used to inform policy decisions. Second, it will design, implement and integrate powerful data analytics tools, data pipelines and applications that support the management of the entire lifecycle of corruption intelligence pictures. This will enable comprehensive corruption risk assessment, informed policy making, and improved anticorruption law enforcement
